Printmaking Basics

- Printmaking is the transfer of an image from one surface to another using ink or other media.

History of the Marais Press, University of Louisiana at Lafayette

In 1991 Adjunct Instructor Mary McBride worked with faculty in the Department of the Visual Arts to bring the study of lithography to campus. McBride, who earned her BFA here at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette and her MFA at the University of New Mexico had advanced knowledge of lithography. She acquired her expertise working in graduate school studying under Lecturer John Sommers and Technical Director of the Tamarind Institute of Lithography, Professor Jane Abrams (1975-83). Professor Clinton Adams, Director of the Tamarind Institute of Lithography (1970-85), a co-writer of Tamarind Techniques for Fine Art Lithography with Garo Antreasian also served as a mentor to McBride. The auspicious beginning of her career set the tone for printmaking at the Marais Press by normalizing the idea of seeking out artists from across the country to share their expertise.

With the support of then Department Head Tom Ladousa as well as renowned artist and printmaker Tom Secrest, the Alumni Association agreed to provide seed money on the condition that sales of prints would be used to offset costs and fund student scholarships. Dean Gordon Brooks and Professor Allan Jones were also early supporters of what became known as the Marais Press. Jones' knowledge of lithography was viewed as a crucial additional resource for helping introduce students to the technical aspects of lithography.

Before the first print could be pulled, the press needed a name and inspiration was found in Professor John Hathorn's then recent visit to the fashionable Marais district of Paris. Dutch Kepler, professor and graphic designer, knew that marais translated to swamp or marsh and the name would be a natural fit for a printing press based in Louisiana's bayou country. The chop or logo (similar to a piece of type used by typesetters on letterpresses) for the Marais Press - a mosquito - was also Kepler's brainchild, but it is unclear whether he or students designed the now iconic mark found on most Marais Press projects.

The first two editions Mary McBride undertook were with Elemore Morgan, Jr., the prominent Louisiana painter and then faculty member. Morgan loved the process of learning lithography. The scale of Morgan's experimentation resulted in a popular exhibition of unfinished states of the two 1992 editions on view in 20 Years of Marais

Press. Alumna Paula Stude was indispensable as she helped complete both of Morgan's editions with McBride. The last edition created in 1994 before McBride moved on was by John Buck who came to campus at the invitation of faculty member Tom Secrest. In McBride's absence, the press was inactive for several years.

In 1999, Brian Kelly was hired in the Department of Visual Arts as Assistant Professor and Area Coordinator of Printmaking. Early on, he found the Marais Press chop and learned from Allan Jones about its history. Previously, he was at Southeastern Louisiana University where he taught printmaking and oversaw service-learning printmaking projects that quickly became synonymous with the Marais Press. The first artist Kelly invited to collaborate with his students was Kimberly Paul Arp, his graduate school mentor at Louisiana State University. After a short while, Kelly used proceeds from successful Marais Press print sales to fully endow the Pat Terry/Marais Press Visual Arts Endowed Scholarship.

The Marais Press continues to operate successfully and functions as a bellwether for collaboration in the printmaking community nationally, but particularly in Louisiana. The establishment of the annual faculty-led symposium, *This Print Thing We Are Doing: An Undergraduate Symposium* in 2013 is a prime example of how the spirit of the Marais Press helped create a collaborative educational community. Co-founded by Brian Kelly, the symposium is hosted by a different university art department in Louisiana each year. The 2016 formation of the UL Print Club, a student-run organization emphasizing educational demonstrations and partnerships further illustrates the influence of the Marais Press.

Dozens of students' careers have been impacted by the Marais Press. It has served as a vehicle for mentorship that balances academic excellence with learning by doing. Kelly and his students have worked with a variety of commercial clients including the Contemporary Arts Center New Orleans and Dusti Bongé Foundation. In addition to working in an apprenticeship mode with visiting artists, students have worked on countless Marais Press exhibitions and projects throughout the United States, Australia, and Canada as well as in the production of other printed editions that have been exhibited throughout the United States, Ireland, Poland, Canada, Japan, and South Korea. One particularly notable curatorial project Kelly undertook with his

students was *Bring on The Top Hats: The Works of David F. Driesbach* at Contemporary Arts Center New Orleans in partnership with the Southern Graphics Council International.

The staggering advances in printing and imaging technology since the founding of the Marais Press in 1991 has irrevocably changed the nature of printmaking, requiring fine art and commercial printers alike to be students of the history of printing as well as innovators in order to meet the needs of artists and clients. Because of the emphasis on education and experimentation in academia, it comes as no surprise that a university campus is one of the places innovations in printmaking and communities of print spring up as proving grounds for young artists. For example, the service-learning model of the Marais Press also exists at the Island Press at Washington University in St. Louis and the Rutgers Print Collaborative in New Jersey. Tamarind Institute in New Mexico and Tandem Press at the University of Wisconsin, Madison work with similar models, but are institutions that exist outside the art departments at their respective universities. The differences between these types of presses are minimal and illustrate how variation is substantial within the field, even at some of the most respected presses. These institutions represent only a small part of the highly interconnected printmaking community in the United States, but they are indicative of widespread excellence. Twenty Years of Marais Press is an early foray into the scholarship of the structure and customs of this under-documented community, and the Hilliard Art Museum is honored to present this as a contribution to the art historical narrative.

His sculptural and print works are rich with a visual vocabulary drawn from current events, popular culture, and the ironies of world history. Buck received a BFA from Kansas City Art Institute. He also studied at Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture and received an MFA from the University of California-Davis. Born in Ames, IA, he and his wife, artist Deborah Butterfield, divide their time between a farm in Bozeman, MT and studios on the island of Hawaii. The DeCordova Museum, the Fine Arts Museums of San Francisco, the Hawaii State Art Museum, the Honolulu Museum of Art, the Smithsonian American Art Museum, and the Yellowstone Art Museum are among the public collections that hold his works.

Arp draws additional inspiration from Medieval painting and manuscripts, exploration of the natural world, and life's inherent strangeness. Arp was born in Traverse City, Michigan, and now lives in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He holds a BFA in Printmaking from Northwestern Michigan College and an MFA from Indiana University. Arp has taught printmaking at Louisiana State University for thirty-eight years. His work has been shown in exhibitions in Chicago, Houston, and Scotland, and he has held residencies at the Venice Printmaking Studio, Peacock Printmakers, and the Haystack School of the Crafts. Arp's work also resides in the collections of the Indianapolis Museum of Art, Aberdeen Art Museum, and New Orleans Museum of Art.

Gerald Cannon utilizes multiple media formats to explore the conundrum of determining what is true and what is real. He has studied and been influenced by the work of Bacon, Duchamp, Baldessari, Flannery O'Connor, as well as many other artists and writers. Cannon studied at the University of North Alabama and received an MFA from the University of New Orleans. Born in Alexander City, AL, he currently resides in Slidell, LA. He retired as the Benjamin Distinguished Professor Emeritus in Fine Art at Loyola University New Orleans. Cannon has held a residency in Austria, shown work in the New Orleans Museum Triennial and SIGGRAPH Exhibition, and Clark Gallery at Southeastern University, including a 20-year retrospective. He has also received the Louisiana Regent's ATLAS Grant. His work resides in the collections of the New Orleans Museum of Art, Contemporary Art Center New Orleans, and the Hunter Museum in Chattanooga, TN.

Lynda Frese is a painter, photographer, and printmaker interested in exploring human relationship with the natural world. Her work finds inspiration in the art of prehistoric peoples, as well as in Renaissance religious themes and rituals which reference the sacredness of nature. Frese grew up in New England, and earned BA and MFA degrees from the University of California at Davis. She was recently awarded Professor Emerita from the Department of Visual Arts at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, after thirty years of teaching. Her work has been exhibited at the Skowhegan School of Painting and Sculpture Fellowship, Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship, and the Bogliasco Foundation Fellowship. She has held residencies at the American Academy in Rome, White Artist Colony, Ginestrelle Art Studio, RUC Rural Contemporary Arts, and the Hambidge Center for the Arts and Science. She has received awards from the National Trust for Historic Preservation, the NEA, and the Louisiana State Arts Council. Additionally, her exhibition "Lynda Frese: Holy Memories & Earthly Delights", at the Hilliard Art Museum (February 17– May 19, 2018) surveyed 40 years of the artist's work, from early toned gelatin silver prints produced in California to recent photo-collage and egg tempera works; an eponymous monograph with critical essays were published by UL Press. Her works deal with stories and images of women's objects intermingled with natural imagery of fruits, plants, insects, worms, and fish, representing feminine identity and her personal stories and memories. Although she works with visual imagery, her main artistic influences come from literature and fairytales. Her recent works are inspired by Korean folk paintings called *Minhwa*. Choi's artistic training began in painting. She received a BFA and an MA in Painting at Ewha University in Seoul, and an MFA in Computer Arts at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. She was born in Seoul, South Korea and she currently lives in Louisiana, teaching computer arts and animation at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. Karoline Schleh's drawings, paintings, and prints are atmospherically rendered and often include fumage marks and longhand backwards script. Her work is inspired by handwriting, landscape, animal and human forms, as well as the songs and stories we choose to tell. Schleh's reversed handwriting developed from her training as a printmaker, writing backwards onto copper etching plates in order for the words to print forwards in the final print. Eventually, the print plates were abandoned and the handwriting reversals stood on their own in her drawings and paintings. Born in New Orleans, LA, Schleh holds a BFA in Printmaking from Tulane University, and an MFA in Printmaking from Louisiana State University. She also participated in Robert Blackburn's Printmaking Workshop NYC and trained at Vinalhaven Press in Maine. She was one of four artists honored at LOVE in the Garden 2017, and has had a solo exhibition at Ann Connelly Fine Art. She has also exhibited at *New Orleans Artists* in Telluride, CO and *Louisiana Contemporary*. Schleh's work resides in the collections of the New Orleans Museum of Art, Pollock Krasner Foundation, Robert Blackburn's Printmaking Workshop NYC, Harvey Littleton Studios, and Magnolia Hotels in New Orleans.

The printmaker Robert L. Bornhuetter worked with intaglio, relief, lithography and seismography. His art is an accumulation of human experience as a student and a teacher. As an undergraduate, Bornhuetter studied printmaking at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and later completed an MFA in Printmaking at Tulane University. Originally from Kenosha, Wisconsin, he held the title of Professor Emeritus of Printmaking at Northern Illinois University. Over his career, Bornhuetter exhibited his work in a total of 116 shows, nationally and internationally, in 30 states and several countries. Of these, 22 were solo exhibitions. His work has been collected extensively, both domestically and internationally.

Michael Ray Charles is a contemporary American painter. His work explores historic African American stereotypes from the Antebellum South, appropriating images from advertising and pop culture to expose the underlying racism prevalent in contemporary culture. Charles creates a mimetic vocabulary of cultural, racial, and historicized images to subvert those themes and explore surviving caricatures that continue to appear in popular media, such as Aunt Jemima or Sambo. Born in Lafayette, LA in 1967, he went on to earn his BFA from McNeese State University and his MFA from the University of Houston. He was appointed as the Hugh Roy and Lillie Cranz Cullen Distinguished Professor of Painting in 2014 at the University of Houston's School of Art, and he has exhibited internationally, notably in the Austin Museum of Art, the Knox Art Gallery, and The Museum of Modern Art in New York.

Eva Nikolova works in drawing, printmaking, hand-drawn animation, and cameraless photography. Her work explores themes of memory and identity in relation to place. Since 2012, Nikolova has created hand-drawn, cameraless gelatin silver photographs that blur the lines between drawing and photography. His extraordinary talent and determination has recently brought him a *Peoples Health Champion's Award* as an individual over the age of 65 who has made a notable achievement in art conservation, specifically, removing mold from fine art etchings printed on even the most fragile types of paper.

Daniel DiCaprio is a metalworker who produces jewelry and sculptures inspired by plant and animal anatomy. He imagines his creations are organisms on the beginning of their evolutionary path, having just made a great change that will propel them forward in a competitive world. This in turn refers to what we are and where we came from while alluding to the future. DiCaprio earned his MFA in Metal Design from East Carolina University and a BS in Art Education from Nazareth College. Before coming to the University of Louisiana at Lafayette, DiCaprio ran a studio practice, worked as a professional goldsmith, and taught Jewelry and Metalsmithing at Virginia Commonwealth University. DiCaprio is represented by Charon Kransen Arts and has exhibited at SOFA, now Intersect Chicago, since 2008. That same year he was the SOFA Emerging Artist Lecturer sponsored by the Society of North American Goldsmiths. In 2013, he was the recipient of the Peter S. Reed Grant, an invitational arts grant meant further emerging artists' studio practices. He has exhibited broadly in the United States, as well as in Japan, South Korea, Italy, Spain and Germany. DiCaprio's work has been featured in American Craft, Metalsmith, Essence, and the Norwegian art magazine Kunsthåndverk.

Raluca Iancu

Canadian/Romanian, born 1989

Raluca lancu's installation Sequence of Events was completed in part while she was a visiting artist at the Marais Press at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. The first layer is printed in relief from an MDF block that was cut with a CNC router, combining 20th century technology with one of the earliest printmaking techniques; woodcut prints. Woodcut prints date from as early as the 15th century in Europe, and the 8th century in China and Japan. Iancu found inspiration for Sequence of Events in the overpasses of Dallas, as well as by the Turcot interchange in Montreal, Canada. She synched diagrams of these two references together into an uninterrupted pattern that brings beautiful wallpaper to mind. This decorative motif belies the intentions of the second layer of block printing in Sequence of Events. The second layer consists of many vehicular collisions. The collisions have a stylized appearance, looking as though they might be found on the key to a map or in a child's room. These many little wrecks, situated in a beguiling, endlessly looping roadscape reference how people interact with one another. The implication being that most interactions we have with other people are like collisions. We are selfishly oblivious to our impact on others because we are busy. Busy like those who only take the beauty of Sequence of Events at face value from afar.

Ben Hickey, the curator of this exhibition, became interested in the Marais Press in 2017 when he and Iancu installed *Sequence of Events* at the *Outside Gallery*, a street art venue in Monroe, Louisiana. That same year Hickey was the keynote speaker for *This Print Thing We Are Doing #*5, an annual symposium co-founded by Brian Kelly. Planning for *Twenty Years of Marais* Press began a year later when Hickey became the curator of exhibitions at the Hilliard Art Museum.

Glossary of Printmaking Terms

These terms were sourced from the International Print Center New York and can be found on their website under the Education tab.

What is a print?

Technically, a print is any image that is transferred from a matrix. A matrix is a physical surface that can be manipulated to hold ink. Most, though not all, matrices are able to print the same image many times.

How is a color print made?

There are several ways to make a multi-color print, but the most common is to print a different matrix for each color. The matrices are precisely aligned and sequentially printed on a sheet of paper to produce a composite image.

What are the inscriptions on the bottom of the print?

Traditionally, signifying inscriptions are written in pencil at the bottom of a print. Reading from left to right, the inscriptions indicate the edition number, the title of the artwork, and the artist's name (and sometimes the date).

Techniques

Aquatint: An etching technique that creates printed tonal areas. Powdered rosin is distributed across a metal plate and adhered through heating. When the plate is submerged in a corrosive bath, tiny areas unprotected by the rosin particles are "eaten away", creating recesses. Once the rosin is removed, the plate is inked, and ink collects in those areas with uneven surfaces. Finally, damp paper is laid on the plate, and they are run through a press, transferring ink in the shape of these areas. Usually the more an area is eaten away, the more ink will transfer during printing, and the darker the tonal area will be.

Chine-collé: The process of adhering one piece of paper to another by using a liquid adhesive and running them together through the printing press. *Chine* is French for "China," which refers to the thin Asian paper originally used with this technique, and *collé* means "glued."

Collagraph: A technique of relief printing using any combination of actual elements such as cardboard, fabric, washes, carborundum (an abrasive powder), or found objects, which are adhered to a plate, inked, and printed.

Digital printing: A general term for any technique that involves digital technology. Until the mid-1990s, most computer-made images were transferred photochemically onto traditional printing plates or screens. Since then, many artists have used high-resolution digital printing processes on computer-controlled printers. Sometimes the terms Inkjet (a type of printer), Giclée (the French term for inkjet), or Iris (a brand of printer) are used to refer to the printing process.

Drypoint: An intaglio technique in which marks are cut directly into a metal plate using a tool with a sharp point. The drypoint needle is used like a pencil to incise lines into the plate, displacing ridges of metal called burrs. The plate is wiped with ink, which collects in the incisions as well as under the burrs. Damp paper is laid on the plate, and they are run through a press together, transferring ink from both the incision and the burr, resulting in the drypoint's characteristic fuzzy line.

Engraving: A technique that creates precise lines which swell in the middle and taper at the ends. Lines are incised into a bare metal plate using a burin, a tool with a V-shaped blade. The plate is wiped with ink, which collects in the incisions. Damp paper is laid on the plate, and they are run through a press together, transferring ink from the incisions to the paper.

Etching: An intaglio technique that can create a wide variety of printed marks. A resist is first applied to a clean metal plate (such as zinc or copper). The resist is selectively scraped off to reveal the bare plate beneath. When the plate is placed in a corrosive acid bath, only the exposed metal areas corrode. The plate is then inked; ink remaining on the surface of the plate is wiped away with cheesecloth, news print, or hand-wiping. Damp paper is laid on the plate; paper and plate are run through a press, and the ink is transferred from the recesses to the paper.

Intaglio: A term for the family of printing techniques which transfers ink from the recesses of a matrix, rather than from its surface. Techniques using intaglio printing include etching, engraving, drypoint, aquatint, and mezzotint. Intaglio comes from the Italian word *intaglaire*, which means "to incise."

Letterpress: A relief technique for printing movable type (though blocks with images may also be used). Metal, wood, or polymer forms of a standard height are set in place in the bed of a press. Since

ink is transferred from the surface of the blocks by the application of pressure, letterpress prints are recognizable for their embossed printed forms.

Linocut (Linoleum Cut): A relief technique using a sheet of linoleum from which shapes are gouged away using chisels or knives, leaving the printing image as the raised surface. Ink is transferred from the surface of the block by the application of pressure. Linoleum is softer and therefore easier to carve than wood; however, it exhibits neither wood's characteristic grain nor its durability.

Lithography: A planographic technique that can print a variety of drawn and painterly marks. Traditionally, a grease pencil or tusche (greasy watercolor) is applied to a flat slab of limestone, selectively filling the stone's pores. A chemical mixture securely bonds the stone before water is used to fill the remaining pores. The oil-based ink used is attracted only to those areas that have retained grease. Damp paper is laid on the face of the stone, and they are run through a press together, transferring ink from the surface. Aluminum plates may also be used.

Mezzotint: An intaglio technique in which the surface of a metal plate is first uniformly pitted using a rocker. A mezzotint rocker is serrated on the bottom and must be rocked back and forth by hand, a demanding task. A rounded metal tool called a burnisher is then used to gradually and selectively smooth out areas, causing them to retain less ink. Damp paper is laid on the plate, and they are run through a press together. The fully pitted areas transfer more ink than the burnished sections, creating mezzotint's characteristic gradations of tone.

Monotyping: A technique involving the painting, rolling, or scraping of ink onto a uniform surface, which is transferred to paper by the application of pressure. Because the monotype matrix is unaltered and each unique inking is transferred in a single printing, the print cannot be duplicated, hence its name.

Offset printing: A technique commonly used in commercial printing where an image is transferred first to a rubber cylinder on a mechanized press, from which it is then printed onto paper. An indirect process, offset printing is beneficial because it does not reverse the image from the matrix, nor does the matrix deteriorate quickly. A common use of this technique is offset lithography.

Photogravure: A general term for any metal plate process in which an image has been transferred to a metal surface by photographic means. A corrosive bath is used to incise the image into the plate before inking and printing. Photoetching is a term alternatively used.

Screenprinting: A technique using stencils made of silk or a synthetic fabric, which has been stretched over a frame. Areas of the screen that are not part of the printing image can be blocked out using a variety of methods. In one common method, the screen is first evenly coated with a water-soluble, light-sensitive liquid. A transparency bearing a printed image prevents projected UV light from hardening parts of the screen. Unhardened areas are then washed out with water before a squeegee is used to press ink evenly through the screen, directly onto paper or fabric. This technique is also known as silkscreen or serigraphy.

Woodcut: A relief technique using a plank of wood from which shapes are gouged away using chisels or knives, leaving the printing image as the raised surface. Ink is transferred from the surface of the block by the application of pressure. Woodcuts are characteristic both for the grain that is often evident in the printed image, as well as for their durability.

Wood Engraving: A relief technique requiring a hard plank of wood, which is incised with fine lines using sharp tools. Unlike the woodcut, a wood engraving requires a harder plank whose face is cut perpendicular to the grain. Ink is transferred from the surface of the block by the application of pressure.

Artist Annotations

Artist's Proof (A.P.): A print reserved for the artist and not included in the numbered edition. An artist's proof can be identified by the inscription "A.P." found in the lower left-hand margin. Alternatively, printer's proofs are reserved for the printer and are inscribed "P.P."

Bon à Tirer (B.A.T.): A print that is not included in the edition, but which indicates the standard a printer tried to duplicate for the edition. A print which is *bon à tirer* (translated from French as "ready to pull") can be identified by the inscription "B.A.T." found in the lower left-hand margin. See also, Good to Pull/GTP.

Edition: A set of identical prints made from the same matrix (or set of matrices). Often a number of other prints – artist's proofs, printer's proofs, bon à tirer, and *hors commerce* ("not for trade") prints – are made at the same time but are not considered to be part of the numbered edition. Each print in a limited edition is usually numbered in the lower left-hand margin. The form of this inscription is as follows: number in the edition/size of the edition (i.e. 15/50). To guarantee a limited edition, the artist or printer can "strike" the plate by incising an X on the printing face after completion.

Impression: Any numbered print from a completed edition.

Printer: The specialist who provides technical aide throughout the printing process. A master printer may have a group of assistants. Historically, printmaking has been characterized by a divided production process, where artist and printer work collaboratively but accomplish different tasks.

Proof: A print that is not considered to be part of the numbered edition. Examples include prints made in advance of the edition – known as "trail proofs" – as well as those made at the time of the edition, but which are reserved for the artist or printer.

Publisher: The entity responsible for funding the development and production of an edition. Commonly, this is in exchange for either a percentage of the edition or of the profits from its sale. Some printshops publish their own editions.

Tools

Acid: A term sometimes used to refer to the corrosive solution in which a metal plate is etched for intaglio printing. The concentration of this bath is precisely measured, as is the period of a plate's submersion.

Baren: Hand tool used to firmly rub the back of the sheet of paper in order to pick up ink from the matrix.

Brayer: A roller used to spread ink on a matrix.

Matrix: A physical surface that can be manipulated to hold ink, which is then transferred to paper. Most, though not all, matrices are able to print the same image many times. Matrices used in printmaking include blocks of wood, sheets of linoleum, metal plates, sheets of Plexiglass, and slabs of limestone.

Relief Carving Tools: Tools, such as chisels and knives, used to carve into a matrix of wood or linoleum.

Resist: An etching resist (such as hard ground or asphaltum) is applied to the plate in order to prevent an acid solution from corroding the surface. The artist scratches off the resist using a variety of etching tools: these lines are etched into the plate by exposing the bare metal to acid.
